- Assemble any used boxes that have been flattened
- Stack and arrange boxes in a cascading style use the biggest boxes on the bottom for stability
 - o Construct near an outlet if you are going to be using the water light effect
- Using gaffer's tape, tape the boxes together to hold the shape and form of your waterfall
- Cut 3' 5' sections of the heavy duty contractor's paper they do not need to be perfect, this just makes the stapling process easier to manage
- Staple the top edge of the paper just over the back of and at the top of your box formation.

 Depending on how much of your waterfall will be seen, you may not need to cover the entire back of the formation
- Crinkle, fold and create puffs in the paper as you go, stapling between the puffs to create a rocky surface
- Once your formation has been covered to your liking with its new rocky surface, lay the painter's drop cloth around the bottom of the waterfall
- Lightly spray (or dust) the cracks and crevices of the folds with the brown spray paint to give the rocky surface even more depth let it dry remove painter's drop cloth
- Attach your greenery garlands, winding in and out of the puffs, from the top to the bottom by either stapling or taping – which ever works best in the area you're applying the greenery at the time
- Add the tall grassy reeds
- Take the batting out of the bags and begin to stretch into what looks like cascading water
- Using the spray glue, spray the area where you are going to place the batting
- Press the stretched out batting onto the glue surface
- Tuck and tape in/on your tissue paper flowers
- Bunch up your blue water fabric at the bottom to create the water pool effect
- Place your water light(s) strategically so that they shine upward onto the formation, and it looks like water appears to be moving on the waterfall
- Look at you go! You did it...you made a fantastic waterfall!
